# MHLS Report to Member Library Directors | September 2024

The format of this report is based on the MHLS service priorities as determined by MHLS stakeholders.

#### 1. Delivery Services

- a. Bright Benyi is a **new substitute driver** for MHLS delivery vendor, Valley Courier. Member library staff may have met Bright already as he has been covering route #2 for the past few weeks while primary driver Rony Cantarero was on vacation.
- b. **Mitigating Service Interruptions / Temporary Storage**: MHLS Delivery Operations recently worked with the D.R. Evarts Library in Athens with a temporary delivery location as they completed a construction project. Also, the department assisted the Howland Public Library in Beacon with a hold on delivery and storage of their materials during a painting project. Let us know if you have or need any special delivery requests during renovations, construction, or emergency situations.
- c. If any extra **delivery bins** have accumulated in your library over the summer and after the Labor Day holiday, please place them next to your regular outgoing bins for the drivers to pick up.
- d. A Better World Books (BWB) drop box has been in operation at MHLS since 2016 to assist member libraries and the public with re-purposing their materials. Better World Books accepts all books in readable condition and is a self-sustaining, for-profit social venture whose mission is to capitalize on the value of the book to fund literacy initiatives locally, nationally and around the world. BWB partners with nearly 3,100 libraries and over 1,800 college campuses across the U.S. and Canada, collecting unwanted textbooks and library discards in support of non-profit literacy programs. # 2. Integrated Library System & Cataloging Services

a. **Ecommerce in Discover:** As reported previously, in the months after launching Discover, we became aware of some occasional errors in our credit card transactions. Some payments made were not posted to Sierra and other payments were paid in duplicate and even triplicate! MHLS began the task of monitoring the transactions in a reconciliation process between PayPal payments and Sierra's Fines Paid report. Where payments had not posted to the patron record, we manually posted. Where duplicate payments were made refunds were given. In each case of refund the library was notified to inform the patron. The error rate was quite low, a handful each month.

We continued to report the errors to Innovative and worked closely with them to run tests on changes to the APIs in Sierra and Paypal. In July Innovative solved the issue and we were patched with a fix that would eventually become part of the next release. We will continue the process of reconciliation for a few more months, just to be sure, but at this time we have not seen a recurrence since the fix was applied to our site.

b. **New things to discover in Discover!** The Discover catalog continues to evolve with fixes, updates and enhancements each week. It's a lot! The best way to stay on top of what has happened, what is happening and what will happen is to check the Vega Discover product roadmap.

• Advanced Search: The actual advanced search did not match the description and is

disappointing. The search is merely a prompt to insert AND and NOT within your search to either join keywords that must be included or excluded. There is also a suggestion to make use of facets to further filter.




• Staff Access with Defined User Roles: We are in the early stages and there are some wrinkles that have yet to be ironed, but we can now offer designated staff access to manage areas of service within LX Starter and Discover. Initially staff accounts were tied to a patron account in the ILS, which was weird. Now users have a unique login that uses their name and email address and a self managed password. Each account is assigned roles which have specific access witin the platforms.



- Scheduling is available! MHLS is an early adopter for a very exciting feature of Discover Homepage custom design. In our most recent update, the ability to create and schedule updates to the homepages was added. This means staff can go in and create up to 10 future versions of their homepage to be published at a later date. You can set your seasonal edits to go live in on a future date and time.
- c. **LX Starter has Launched!** Our number pilot libraries has reached a tipping point, and so far the feedback from staff using the platform is fairly positive. We now have 22 libraries trained and working in the platform, and 3 more scheduled to come onboard. Of the 22 sites 8 have published their templates and are actively using the notices. (See the published notices here!) Libraries who use LX Starter get more than a more engaging notification, they get real data back about the notices that are sent. Here is a look at the performance report from one of the publishing libraries. This is Elting Memorial Library's (New Paltz) OverDue notice.





• **Discover Custom Homepages for your Collection Sites and Kiosks:** Each library has been set up with a custom Kiosk and Collection site. These sites are ready for you to begin editing,

once designated staff have been trained for access.

<u>Collection sites:</u> allow the catalog to be customized to a particular library (or group of libraries, such as a branch system) without the patron needing to be logged in **Kiosk sites:** are designed for in-library use, prioritizing giving patrons information about the items that are available to them physically then and there without needing to be logged in. You can configure kiosk sites for each branch if your library has multiple branches.

These sites can have your own logo and colors, display local call numbers and site info with priority and have a homepage customized with your own content. Library staff can be trained to manage these sites with local content.

• Patron Mobile App: We are looking for more libraries who would like to have earlier access to the Patron Mobile App by being pilot test libraries. At this time, we have PPLD in place and in the process of customizing with Mahopac and Marlboro soon to follow. Once customized by the library, the app can be placed in both the Apple and Android stores for patrons to download. More information about the patron mobile app can be found on our Knowledge Base with screen captures and examples of customization.

#### 3. Coordinated IT Services

- a. Schools and Libraries Cyber Security Pilot Program: The FCC is launching a new 3-year pilot program, available to Schools and Libraries, to help the FCC both understand and counter the recent threats of cyber-attacks on both schools and libraries.
  - All MHLS libraries meet the eligibility requirements.

- You can apply for the program and not apply for E-Rate.
- You cannot request reimbursement for the same items in both programs.
- Not used for staff or labor costs.
- 3-year commitment
- Requires E-Rate competitive bidding process

\$200 million dollars will be spent over three years. The selection criteria for participation will use risk factors and economic need to award access to the program. A diverse group will be selected and there are no specific amounts set for distribution by state. There is a 3-year maximum allocation of \$45,000 for an individual library or site. The program provides reimbursement/discount at the same rate as E-Rate's category 1. The library is required to cover the non-discounted portion of the costs.

The program can subsidize a wide variety of items including advanced next generation firewalls, endpoint protections, identity protection and authentication, monitoring, detection and response costs, as well as training. (see a detailed list). Many local vendors (Crown Castle, Verizon, Spectrum) are already reaching out to potential participants, to discuss services that can be covered with this program.

The application process starts with FCC form 484 Part 1. Information in that form will be used as a selection criterion. There will be a window for filing. The opening has not yet been announced beyond "in the fall" and no information is available about how long the window is. You will need a current FCC

Registration number, a SAM.gov registration and you must also have completed the FCC Form 498. Successful applicants will then complete FCC form 484 part 2, and from looks exactly like E-Rate with a 28 day bidding process (form 470), request for equipment and services (form 471). A Funding Commitment Decision Letter is provided by USAC, and once services start you can submit a request for reimbursement (SPI or BEAR method).

What can you do to be ready?

- Set goals and objectives can you clearly talk about what you might achieve
- Identify your risks Review the <u>see a detailed list</u> to get ideas
- What is the current state of your cybersecurity and how is it experienced by staff and the public

- b. **Computer & Equipment Purchases through MHLS** must be submitted by October 31<sup>st</sup> 2024. Our business office must close purchasing in time for all orders to be filled, invoiced and processed for payment by the end of the year. This is a firm deadline!
- c. **Geo Blocking:** We have begun blocking access to Sierra and Discover products based on the country-based location of a user's IP address sometimes referred to as geo blocking. As librarians this runs directly across our grain, but we have found it is necessary to reduce the number of bots and spiders that are crawling our web-based services, using up critical system resources. We hope this is a low impact step for the majority of our users, since most of our users live here in the Hudson Valley and travel to the country's that are blocked would be minimal, but we do understand that there may be some impact for our patrons who travel to these blocked countries. Patrons trying to log into Discover, OverDrive, Kanopy, Hoopla or any other resource that requires Sierra's APIs or Web Access management authentication, will find that their login fails.

Countries we are currently denying access to include: Russia, China, Singapore, Hong Kong, Burma/Myanmar, Democratic People's Republic of Korea/North Korea, Philippines, Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, Thailand. Innovative provided the list of countries that have been identified within their cloud space. You can expect that this list will expand as we continue to monitor and identify more locations. To help prepare your patrons for travel we have added a <u>patron facing web page</u> that provides patrons with steps to take before traveling. d. Our **Digital Encryption Certification** for all ILS and Discover services will now be managed by Innovative through a certification authority (CA) called Let's Encrypt, a service of the Internet Security Research Group. Prior to this change MHLS was managing this process and passing the certificate to Innovative to apply. This change places the burden of renewal (and the cost) on Innovative as an internal process.

Rest assured, MHLS Tech Ops has our eye on this ball, we monitor the renewal process closely to assure it is initiated and completed in the correct windows.

e. **Erate Cycle for funding Year 2024-25**: It is that time of year to begin the process of Erate. If you have never considered applying or are feeling a little overwhelmed, <u>MHLS has resources to help</u> and will work with you to guide you through the process. If nothing else you can significantly cover the cost of internet service to your building as a way of getting into the process for year 1. # 5. Consulting & Development

a. The NYS Department of Education issued a ruling on August 13, 2024 that defends the rights of library boards to use Education Law section 259 to place budget items on the school district ballot and once again clarifies that only library boards have the right to put a funding proposition on a ballot related to library funding (Decision No. 18,466). The library in question was the Roswell P. Flower Memorial Library in the Watertown School District. This specific issue had already been ruled upon through a lawsuit that found the petitioners case without merit (Matter of Eisenhauer v Watertown City Sch. Dist., 208 AD3d 952, 955 [4th Dept 2022], appeal dismissed, 39 NY3d 944 [2022). This aligns with a previous court ruling specific to 414 votes and the rights of library boards to be the sole entity allowed to place a funding proposition on the municipal ballot for library funding (Matter of George F. Johnson Mem. Lib. V Town Bd. Of Town of Union, (55 AD3d 1036, 1038 [3d Dept 2008], Iv denied 12 NY3d 702 [2009]; see 1981 Opinions of the State Comptroller, No. 81-167 [1981 WL 16740]). This is very meaningful as more than half of MHLS member libraries rely on Education Law 259 to secure sustainable funding for their libraries either through the municipal ballot (414) or school district ballot (259). This is now a third high-level ruling that backs the rights of local library boards and defends against attempts to defund association and municipal public libraries. ## b. FY2025 Inflation and Allowable Levy Growth

The Office of the State Comptroller has issued the Inflation Factor and Allowable Levy Growth Factor for FY2025 Tax Cap calculations for those of you with a calendar fiscal year (Jan 1 - Dec 31):

Inflation Factor: 3.30%

Allowable Levy Growth Factor: 1.0200

All libraries who have every had a public vote on their budget and have their own board of trustees must file the Property <u>Tax Cap Form</u> annually in November. (Yes, even if you are a 414 library that isn't have a vote this year!)

- g. Action Memo #24-04: Essential Documents Inventory Due Date: September 20<sup>th</sup>
  This year we are doing a fresh audit of each library's essential documents. We are requesting each library submit digital copies of all their essential documents and provide information on how required information can be accessed online. MHLS will use these files to create a complete and current

inventory for each member library. These files will aid in library development consultation, the development of best practices and identification of where assistance is needed through our continuing education program.

<u>Action</u>: Download a copy of the <u>MHLS Essential Documents Inventory Workbook</u>. Use the workbook to help identify and log:

- Documents your board has approved and that are on file
   Use the External, Internal & Personnel tabs of the workbook to indicate the status of a policy
   (complete or in progress), the date it was last revised and any useful notes
- The documents your board needs to work on
   If a file doesn't exist, mark it as in progress, put them on your board's to do list, and enter the
   anticipated completion date in the note field. Prioritize any items color coded in pink, these are the
   ones needed to meet the Minimum Standards for Public Libraries.
- The availability (in print and online) of documents required to be publicly available
   Use the Publicly Available tab of the workbook to indicate listed items are available in print and online. Enter the URL for where the listed information is located online (in the future, this will act as a handy log to test for broken links)
- Use the items marked "No" to create a to do list for meeting Minimum Standard 11.



## 6. Cooperative Collection Development & Digital Collection Access

a. NovelNY connects New Yorkers to electronic resources, providing full text access to thousands of journals, newspapers and reference databases for more than 20 years. In 2024 NovelNY was on the chopping block, but a groundswell of support has kept it in place for the immediate future.

All New Yorkers can access NOVELny directly by visiting <a href="https://novelnewyork.org/">https://novelnewyork.org/</a>. While in New York State, you can click "Use Location" to login with a geo locator that uses your IP to identify your vicinity. Access NOVELny resources by using one of the Login methods below



When you travel you can log in using you Driver or non-Driver state ID.

Libraries can also provide access to NOVELny directly from their own web sites. Each library has unique URLs for all databases that track the usage that takes place using the library link.

b. Our centrally supported Universal Class account will be ending at the end of September. After learning of a double-the-cost price increase, the Central Library/Collection Development Advisory Committee decided In February of 2024 that the Universal Class should not be renewed. The committee members were charged with taking the discussion back to the county associations for discussion. At the May meeting, after reviewing county discussions, the final decision to not renew was made. We will have access to the admin portal through October 10<sup>th</sup>, based on the countdown posted there, but our subscription ends on 9/29. Ulster County Library Association will continue to provide Universal Class and assume local administration for the resource. All links to Universal Class will be removed from MHLS hosted websites in the first week of October, including public facing access from MHLS and Discover toolbars.

# 7. Awareness & Advocacy Services

a. The Road Map Exploratory Committee has recommended that this program be pursued for 2025. The rough timeline would be for summer 2025 with plenty of lead time for staff training and publicity. The committee's goal is for the program to be centrally funded, meaning no ask for member libraries to chip in. Stay tuned for more info!

#### b. State Advocacy

- Our bill to create more flexibility in awarding State Aid for Construction Aid funds to economically disadvantaged/distressed communities was signed into law by Governor Hochul. A.9076-A/S.7093-A
- 2025 Budget Advocacy: The New York Library Association is hard at work on state budget advocacy on our behalf earlier than ever.
  - 1. We will be making some bold budget asks based in reality this year. The change in thinking allows for the numbers being used to be easily explained rather than the "soft" numbers used in the past.
    - a. The operating aid ask will simply take the amount from the first time the formula was calculated and adjust for inflation through this fiscal year. 2025 ask: \$176.8 million
    - b. The State Aid for Library Construction ask will be based on the total reported need, parsed over five years. 2025 ask: \$175 million.
  - 2. We will work to lock-in state aid for NOVELny which was first established in this year's state budget.
- 2025 Legislative Advocacy: We will cut down on the number of priority bills advocated for in the first quarter of next year. Rather than a laundry list of asks, many of which impact small segments of the library community our first phase of legislative advocacy will focus on:

- 1. Freedom to Read/Intellectual Freedom Bills for both public and school libraries.
- 2. eBook Licensing Reform
- 3. K-12 Certified School Librarian Requirement
- Save the Date: NYLA Library Advocacy Day will be Wednesday, February 5<sup>th</sup>, 2025 in Albany

## 8. Interlibrary Loan Services

a. MHLS has suspended limits on media or content that can be borrowed through MHLS interlibrary loan. MHLS will continue to limit requests to items that do not exist as circulating copies (regardless of demand) in our own collection or through Southeastern Access to Libraries (SEAL). In addition, MHLS will continue to limit requesting of items that cannot be purchased in new condition for less than \$25 through Amazon. MHLS will prioritize searches to libraries within the Empire Library delivery network, and to the libraries within that system who do not charge fees. Should the loan incur fees or additional shipping, MHLS will provide the amount required to the lending library before placing the request. These fees will be billed to the borrowing library, who in turn can choose to bill the patron. MHLS will reserve the right to place requests or not, depending on the liability involved and the resources required to acquire the item. #### 11. Special Populations

- a. 23 Member libraries have been awarded the MHLS Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Mini Grant. Each grant recipient was awarded \$1,000 to invest in and support the work of promoting and advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion in their library and the communities they serve.
- b. The Poughkeepsie Public Library District in partnership with the Mid-Hudson Library System (MHLS) and Revolucion Radio Online bring the Consulate on Wheels to the Mid-Hudson Library System Auditorium (105 Market Street, Poughkeepsie) Tuesday, October 8<sup>th</sup> through Saturday, October 12<sup>th</sup>. The Consulate General of Mexico provides its Consulate on Wheels in places where it may be difficult to travel to the consular headquarters in the United States, so that they can process important documents, such as passports and consular IDs.

c. The New York State Library has announced the "Digital Access for All" program in partnership with the New York Association on Independent Living (NYAIL), public libraries around the state are eligible to receive a free, in-person accessibility survey this fall.

The New York State Library's Division of Library Development is working with ConnectALL (the NYS Broadband Office), the Empire State Library Network (ESLN), and the New York Association on Independent Living (NYAIL) on a project around technology, accessibility, and libraries intended to help libraries better serve all members of their communities.

Building on a pilot program administered by the South Central Regional Library Council, this project will support libraries in first conducting accessibility assessments and then using their results to implement suggested improvements. This will be guided by an advisory committee made up of the library workers, agencies and organizations who serve the disability community, disability advocates, and people living with disabilities lending their expertise to the project.

Funded through ConnectALL's digital equity program, the assessment phase will occur this fall and be administered by NYSL in partnership with NYAIL. **NYAIL will oversee a number of in-person accessibility surveys as well as the creation of a self-assessment tool for public libraries to identify gaps in their accessible technology offerings**. Each library will receive individualized suggestions, and NYAIL will also create a wider report with general recommendations for all libraries. Following this, libraries will be eligible for grant funds administered by ESLN to obtain equipment and staff training to better serve individuals with disabilities.

For the first phase of in-person evaluations, libraries will be contacted directly by NYAIL, so there is nothing you need to do at this point. Not all libraries have independent living centers in their service areas, but most do; to see the full list of centers, please visit the NYAIL website (a map is also available). All libraries, regardless of proximity to an independent living center, will be able to use the subsequent self-assessment tool and be eligible for assistance in making suggested improvements.
